In addition to the national-level ceremony, observances of National POW/MIA Recognition Day are held across the country on military installations, ships at sea, state capitols, schools and veterans' facilities.

No matter where they are held, these National POW/MIA Recognition Day ceremonies share the common purpose of honoring those who were held captive and returned, as well as those who remain missing.

Mission Briefing from the 2nd Vice – Ernest Cook

In last month's mission briefing I wrote about our honor guard; we're still looking for new volunteers. One point I want to add to last month's text is that we provide the uniform. Since we recently celebrated the 1 year anniversary of our Staff Duty program I wanted to devote this month to that program.

When we started the Staff Duty program the building was not open unless a planned meeting was happening and we suspected just holding the doors open would give more veterans an opportunity to find us. While we haven't been flooded with hundreds of new members, there is no doubt that we have added new members in the last year as a result of the program.

In the last year since post membership has rallied, we have used that time in the building to complete buddy checks with every member not just one but multiple times! Working together, we completed a huge number of maintenance and updates to the building. If you've read the newsletter since January you've seen the transformation to our kitchen from 60+ year old plumbing to modern clean plumbing and a complete renovation to the interior that moves us close to commercial kitchen standards. You've seen the remodel of the entryway to emphasize that we are open to

all Americans, not just American Legionnaires.

More important than membership numbers or building improvements though are the personal stories of veterans that have walked in and found a connection. The veterans that wanted more purpose and found it in helping make the community a better place. THOSE are the stories that make the staff duty program worthwhile!

To be sure, devoting time to be in a building by yourself hoping someone comes by can try the patience of many. Maintenance, phone calls and other chores aren't for everyone but if you're blessed to see just 1 veteran find a connection, if you're ever able to "Be The One", that my friends will stay with you and comfort you as you wait for the next sole looking for a connection. Fortunately, the word is starting to get out so even if you're "on duty" it's not often you are alone.

We do offer an orientation to the duty desk. We try to find ways to help pass the time that are engaging for each individual.

Starting a little history of the Vietnam War

The Vietnam War started in 1950s, according to most historians, though the conflict in Southeast Asia had its roots in the French colonial period of the 1800s. The United States, France, China, the Soviet Union, Cambodia, Laos and other countries would over time become involved in the lengthy war, which finally ended in 1975 when North and South Vietnam were reunited as one country. The following Vietnam War timeline is a guide to the complex political and military issues involved in a war that would ultimately claim millions of lives.

CONTINUING SERIES ABOUT VIET NAM TIME-LINE WHEN WAS THE VIETNAM WAR?

March 1947: In an address to congress, President Harry Truman states that the foreign policy of the United States is to assist any country whose stability is threatened by communism, The policy becomes known as the Truman Doctrine.

June 1949: The French install former emperor Bao Dai as head of State in Vietnam.

August 1949: The Soviet Union explodes its first atom bomb in a remote area of Kazakhstan, marking a tense turning point in the **Cold War** with the United States.

October 1949: Following a civil war, Chinese Communist leader Mao Zedong declares the creation of the People's Republic of China.

January 1950: The People's Republic of China and the Soviet Union formally recognize the communist Democratic Republic of Vietnam and both begin to supply economic and military aid to communist resistance fighter within the country.

February 1950: Assisted by the Soviet Union and the newly Communist China, the Viet Minh step up their offensive against French outposts in Vietnam.

The buddy checks are active, as we have called every member more than once yearly. Finance Officer – John Brekke:

- A report is printed, sent, and provided at the entrance.
- We approved \$2,460 for insurance, but it actually costs \$2,798.00. John requested approval for the additional \$330.00 to cover the cost. Thom Juul moved for budget approval for the extra costs, and Max Badesheim provided a second. There was no discussion, and the motion passed unanimously.
- The reporting looks slightly different now that we have acquired a different accounting package. The current balance is \$44,797.42, and we had an increase of \$3,443.36.
- Thom Juul moved that we accept the report. Doug Foote provided a second. There was no discussion, and the motion passed unanimously.

Historian - Doug Foote:

- Doug reported that he is putting together a scrapbook with event pictures, including pictures from the National Commander visit.
- Doug talked about taking a group that went to two nursing homes to speak to the

Ada County Veterans Council – John Brekke:

- Wreaths Across America has been replaced by an Idaho organization called Idaho Veterans Wreaths. They do the same thing Wreaths Across America did but for less money, and all the funds stay in Idaho. The Idaho Veterans Wreaths is a Boise-only group, but plans are to expand throughout the state. The new organization uses artificial wreaths that can be reused each year.
- Beware of road construction around the Idaho Vets cemetery, which will impede access.
- John reported an accident at the cemetery where a volunteer was struck.
- The VA has a drive-through pantry for veterans. They need donations. If you
 would like to help, talk to John Brekke.
- The Sub Vets are hosting a golf scramble to benefit the USS Boise, which is now in dry dock. It will be at Quail Hollow on September 6, 2024, and the registration fees are \$125.00 solo or \$500.00 for a group. See John Brekke if interested.




